INFORMATION REGARDING THE PUBLIC CHARGE POLICY

- U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services encourages undocumented individuals with symptoms that resemble Coronavirus (COVID-19) {For more information on symptoms please visit the Center for Disease Control Website} to seek necessary medical treatment or preventive services. Treatment or preventive services will not negatively affect undocumented individuals as part of a Public Charge analysis. For more information please visit the USCIS website: www.uscis.gov
- USCIS is suspending in-person services at its field offices, asylum offices, and application support centers from March 18 until April 7th. However, USCIS staff will continue to perform duties that do not involve contact with the public. In the meantime, please call the USCIS [Contact Center](#) for assistance with emergency immigration-related services.

HEALTH INSURANCE

- If you feel sick, with symptoms of fever and dry cough, do not be afraid to seek medical assistance and call your doctor first.
 - ▶ If you need help finding medical care, call the Los Angeles County Information line 2-1-1, which is available 24/7.
 - ▶ You can also locate a provider by going to DHS.LACounty.gov
- If you are pregnant, you can get care in California regardless of immigration status.
- Children under 18 can get care in California regardless of immigration status.
- California offers health coverage to low-income, undocumented adults ages 25 and under for the state's Medical program (Medi-Cal).
